


Library News

On Tuesday 25th February, ahead of the GCSE Options Evening, Year 9 pupils were involved in an **Enterprise Activity Day**. Working with Business Mentors through **Enterprise4Learning**, pupils worked in teams to design a white-knuckled roller coaster ride.

- Agree a company name for their group and the ride
- Decide on the location for their ride and justify their decision
- Create a poster to advertise their ride in mainland Europe
- Prepare and give part of their presentation in a foreign language
- Present and demonstrate their working model to their Business Mentor






Year 9 was divided into six groups with five teams-of-six in each. Pupils worked really well together throughout the day to produce a fantastic range of rollercoaster designs between them. They delivered their presentations before the winning teams from each of the six groups came together for the final.

The final winning team were all from **VJ3** (**Victory House**), with their design and presentation for their ride; **Shark Mania**! Congratulations to all the winning teams and well **done** to all.









Year 9 Imperial War Museum Trip

Year 9 historians embarked upon a trip to the Imperial War Museum in London on the 26th February and 27th February 2025.

The focus of the trip was to view and research the Holocaust exhibition with a teaching session from museum staff. This exhibition holds a variety of books, artworks, letters and personal objects, ranging from jewellery and clothing to toys and musical instruments, along with over 2,000 photos. It is a huge gallery spanning two floors, bringing together the stories of real people from the Holocaust and the Second World War. This visit really helped to connect classroom learning with artefacts from the period.

The Imperial War Museum has a variety of galleries and the pupils were able to explore a number of them in the afternoon. The First and Second World War Galleries were very popular with the pupils. The pupils explored weapons from both wars and also a First World War trench. The accompanying sound effects certainly woke us up! There was also a temporary exhibition called 'new gallery called 'War and the Mind'. Here pupils can explore how human thought, emotion, and behaviour is critical to war. The exhibition investigates the many psychological dimensions, from the First World War to the present day.

We had two wonderful day out. The opportunity for learning outside of the classroom, exploring artefacts and real stories has been missed, so it is great to be able to offer these experiences once again.

The Imperial War Museum

On Wednesday the 26th of March, the other year 9's and I went to the Imperial war museum. The Imperial war museum has everything warfare from modern to World War 1. In the main hall there are many things, some hanging from the ceiling and some on the ground. One of the things that hung was a Spitfire that was used in World War 2 in the Battle of Britain. This Spitfire had 13 pilots and which 6 of them survived the war. Another thing that hung from the ceiling was a Kamikaze suicide bomber, this particular one never went into action which is why it was still intact. The suicide bomber is rocket powered so that it can crash at a high-speed exploding and killing the pilot, hence the name suicide bomber. In the main hall you can also find the V-2 rocket, a missile designed by Dr. Von Braun. The V-2 was deployed in London and killed over

12,000 people. The V-2 is an extremely powerful rocket, all this power comes from the rocket powered engine. The designer (Von Braun) was later captured, after it was deployed, by the Americans, they then interrogated him and later he joined NASA. Wernher Von Braun was a huge part in the end to help with the moon landing in 1969.



A more modern part of war history can also be found in the main hall. In the corner there is a Land Rover used by Reuters in 2006 to report on the war in the Gaza strip. This Land Rover- despite having all the necessary press markings- was hit by an airstrike, although it was armoured it was not enough. The two occupants (Fadel Shana and Sabbah Hmaida) were badly injured. Fadel Shana later returned to war filming and was killed 2 years after when her car got hit by an Israeli tank shell.

The main reason we visited the Imperial War Museum was to learn more about the holocaust. In the IWM they have a fascinating and moving holocaust exhibition which we looked round. It goes in chronological order of when it happened and gave us a very good insight as to how Jews were treated and

how bad the antisemitism was in Germany and eastern Europe. What I found




particularly interesting was the uniforms that were worn in the concentration camps. The prisoners had to wear blue and white striped clothes and wooden clogs. The blue and white striped clothes were worn so that all the prisoners could be seen as inferior by others. The wooden clogs were uncomfortable but were better than no shoes and they protected their feet from all the manual labour. They also had to wear caps and if they were caught without them on then the guards had permission to kill them. Some guards were very harsh and took their hats and threw

them, whilst the prisoner went to get it, they would shoot them. Another thing that I found very interesting in the holocaust exhibition was the area where belongings and papers of Jewish families were. This section showed me how hard it was for these families as they were separated through kinder transport and concentration camps. One of the items in there was a pair of ice skates that belonged to a young Jewish boy named Herbert. Herbert took the ice skates with him on the kinder transport but by the time winter came he had grown out of them. There were also letters from a girl who had been moved from Germany to Britain, she faced much prejudice in Germany even from her teacher. Her teacher had asked her to complete the assignment to draw a

snake and write above it "Jews feed on lies and are destroyed by truth", their parents said that they will not allow that to happen. There were many stories in this exhibition that were very interesting and made me realise how hard it was for Jews during Hitler and the Nazis rule.

My visit to the Imperial War Museum was very compelling and really opened my eyes to the brutality of the wartimes. I learnt a lot about history and was very enjoyable. This trip was very good, and I do recommend it to anyone wanting to go.






On Wednesday 26th February, the Advanced Mathematics Support Program (AMSP) held its Year 10 Kent Maths Feast at Ashford School. Eight students from the school took part in two teams of 4 against ten other schools from Kent. The competition comprised 4 rounds that tested a variety of Maths skills and how to apply them to solve a variety of problems outside of the normal curriculum:

Round 1 – Would I Lie to You? - True or False questions involving a variety of maths topics

Round 2 – Cubes and Ribbons – Solving 3D problems in 2D

Round 3 – Broken Calculators – Given limited buttons to solve numerical problems

Round 4 – Calculator Relay – Solving a variety of maths problems in 2 separate teams



The boys displayed some outstanding maths skills during the competition and collaborated extremely well when solving the problems. Our teams managed to win, or jointly win, most of the four rounds, culminating in them coming first and fifth overall, a fantastic achievement!

Well done to all the boys involved and many thanks to Ashford School for hosting the event and for providing some excellent cake and biscuits..!



The Science Department is very proud of you and your hard work over your first year here at The Harvey Grammar School. Keep up the good work and keep your eye on what is happening next in the Science Department!



On Wednesday the 26th of February (the beginning week of term), Joseph H, Tanjok L, Daijon T, Dimi B, Kai T-A, Ahmad G and myself **Ethan W** all endeavoured with Mrs Shipley to the very first Folkestone and Hythe District Council Youth Forum. This meeting is one of two we will be attending, the second of which is in September of 2025. The forum itself is part of the district's new initiative to involve younger people in local issues that affect them, and understand more about the district's electoral and administrative processes.



Upon entering, we were all awe-struck by the room itself, a large circular hall with rows of seats designated for us.

We even had our own microphones, a real feat to behold! There were about 50 students there, all of whom came from schools ranging from the Marsh Academy, to the Beacon, to the Youth hub, up to larger schools such as Brockhill, Folkestone Academy, and ourselves of course, only a chunk of the students there. Well done to all pupils involved in hockey this year. It has been one of the best seasons the school have had in many years with teams from a variety of year groups being successful at Kent and South East levels.

1st XI Hockey

With the loss of 3/4 of the team having left for university in September this was a very new and developing Harvey 1st XI but the team showed their potential throughout the season. With Year 13's Lorcan D, and Alex T; Year 12's Isaac H and Jack T the team comprised mostly of Year 11 and 10's. But they showed their grit, determination but most of all raw talent to challenge against some of the best teams in the county.

At the Frank Mason tournament the team got through to the plate competition by convincingly beating Skinners School, drawing to a good Simon Langton team and narrowly losing to Kent College 1-0. Going into the afternoon session the boys knew they would be up against some tough opposition but won the quarter final 1-0 against Ashford School and then an even tougher 1-0 against Cranbrook. Unfortunately, they then came up against a very strong Kings School, Canterbury who won 2-0.

The team also performed very well in the Kent Schools Championships at Ashford School getting into the semi final but losing 2-0 to Ashford School who were definitely out for revenge getting knocked out in the Quarter final of the Frank Mason.

Well done to all players involved especially those younger members. The team will certainly go from strength to strength over the next few years if this year is to go by.

The final game of the year has always traditionally been against the Harvey Old Boys and after last years victory for the 1st XI Harvey team it was clear the Old Boys were looking for revenge.
