



The Sixth Form launched our annual charity appeal this year with donations to the local food banks.






TERM 2 – RSHE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education)

This year, our KS3 RSHE programme had been refreshed with a dynamic and engaging new approach. We are excited to introduce a range of new topics and lessons that reflect the evolving needs of our pupils at the Harvey. Our aim to ensure RSHE is recognised as a vital part of the curriculum- supporting pupils' personal development, emotional wellbeing and safety both in and beyond the classroom.

Why does RSHE Matter?

Prepare our students for adult life

Support the development of physically, emotionally and socially healthy young people

Support the development of essential employability skills

Equip our students with the tools to keep themselves safe

Reduce or remove barriers to learning such as bullying, low self-esteem, unhealthy/risky behaviours



This term, our Year 7 pupils have been focusing on the theme '**Building Friendship**'. While Year 7 have settled into Term 2 well, it is important to highlight features of friendship, trust and being able to manoeuvre away from those who can cause distress. The curriculum has been designed to support pupil's personal development and wellbeing throughout Year 7. Pupils have explored the following areas of study:

Building Relationships

- **How do I build a healthy friendship?** – Pupils to work together to review **respect** in friendships and how to build friendships.
- **How do I identify features of an unhealthy friendship?** – How an unhealthy friendship is likely to have an impact on how we are feeling. Coping strategies to move on from feeling low. How do I identify features of an unhealthy friendship?
- **What do I want in a friendship?** - In a friendship we should expect people to display positive behaviours including good communication, politeness, being truthful and celebrating the success of others.
- **Why can making new friends online be unsafe?** Pupils will explore reasons why it is unsafe to make new friends online.
- **What's the difference between bullying and banter?** Pupils will investigate intentional, meaning it is done to purposefully cause harm or upset. It is repeated, meaning it happens more than once and review what to do this this does occur.
- **What are the best strategies for dealing with bullying?** Pupils to work together to review different ways to deal with bullying. Signposting of different places to seek help if bullied.
- **Assessment** – Reviewing and consolidating learning through an end of term assessment.

Y7 RSHE Term Two Learning Journey: Building Relationships

1. Healthy Friendships



This session equips students with the tools to recognise, understand, and build healthy friendships. They will learn the key foundations of a positive relationship and be able to identify and apply features such as respect and boundaries.

3. Making New Friends



This session equips students with the tools they need to identify key features of an unhealthy friendship. They will apply knowledge to a number of scenarios in order to understand boundaries and how unhealthy relationships can make us feel.

This session aims to support students when making new friends. This session links with a session in Unit 1. This session is a focus on creating positive friendships and outlines what things to look out for when making friends.

5ab. Bullying



This session is part of a wider theme on Online Safety which runs concurrently throughout the Year 7 Scheme of work. In this lesson, pupils explore the dangers of making online friendships with a focus on AI and chat bots. Students will engage with a range of support networks.

This is a double session focused on bullying. The session discusses key concepts such as banter and bullying as well as where bullying can take place. The focus of the session is to equip students with the knowledge to understand bullying and its effects.

7. Assessment



This session links with session 5ab and focuses on equipping students with the skills and knowledge about how they can effectively deal with bullying. As well as what not to do, students are informed about what support they can access if they are a victim of bullying.

This session aims to provide you with an opportunity to review the learning this term. You will be assessed on content you have studied this term.

6. How to stop Bullying



This term Year 8 pupils have been exploring the theme of **Identity and Community** in their RSHE lessons. The programme is designed to help pupils make informed, safe choices and understand that different communities have different identities. Pupils are encouraged to have empathy and understanding when considering different communities.

- **What factors affect people's sense of belonging in a community?** Pupils will explore the role of community, diversity and inclusion. Pupils will be encouraged to think about how community fosters connection, support, belonging and often works together to improve the well-being of its members.
- **How do stereotypes and biases influence perceptions and behaviours?** Pupils will investigate the concept of stereotyping and this can influence and persuade certain perceptions. Pupils will also explore biases and prejudices that can influence people's thinking and behaviour.
- **What is Discrimination?** Pupils will describe different types of discrimination and explain how we can challenge discrimination safely.
- **Why is understanding varying perspectives important?** Pupils will identify values that guide behaviour and learn and explain effective strategies to manage disagreements.
- **Why is diversity within communities important?** Pupils will explore ways to promote inclusivity and respect within a community. Plus, why diversity is important.
- **Why are community connections important in the UK?** Pupils will investigate the key features of a community. Pupils will also explore how UK communities are connected.
- **Assessment** – Reviewing and consolidating learning through an end of term assessment.

Y8 RSHE Term Two Learning Journey: Belonging and Community

1. Identity and Community



This session takes a closer look at community and a sense of belonging. The session outlines the differences and diversities within a local community as well as how communities can foster feelings of belonging and safety.

HOMEWORK: Engage with support material and explore the range of ways you can contribute to your local community.

3. Discrimination



A session that is closely linked to session 3. You will engage with stereotyping in all of its forms. This session is designed to help you understand why stereotyping occurs and takes a deep dive into factors that affect decision making.

An important session with in the scheme of work. This lesson covers discrimination in all of its forms. It will equip you with the knowledge and understanding to identify and challenge discrimination safely. As well as providing strategies to help support victims of discrimination.

2. Stereotypes



4. Values and Constructive Disagreement

5. Diverse Communities



This session equips you with the tools to manage disagreement. You will engage with what constructive disagreement is as well as outlining your own values and how they may differ from your peers. The key theme here is acceptance and understanding.

This session focuses on meaning of positive communities and how diversity plays a central role in creating inclusive communities where members feel safe and valued. The session covers cultural, religious and ethnic differences and allows you to reflect on what your local community looks like.

6. Connected Communities (Citizenship)

This session links nicely with lesson 5 focusing on communities. This time through a citizenship lens you will understand the role of the wider community in the UK. This lesson touches on the role of Democracy in Britain and how that can impact you at a local level.



7. Assessment



This session aims to provide you with an opportunity to review the learning this term. You will be assessed on content you have studied this term.

HOMEWORK: To revise for your end of unit assessment.

This term, Year 9 pupils have been exploring an important unit focused on 'Respectful Relationships'. The lessons have been designed to help pupils navigate the complex social issues they may encounter, while equipping them with the knowledge and skills to be empathic, to make safe and informed choices. The lessons have focused on common themes and problems that arise in the 21st Century.

- **Explaining Dementia –Why is Year 9 looking at Dementia?**

There will be at least one person you will know that has a family relation with this disease (if not someone in your own family). It is important with the growing diagnoses of the disease pupils are able to understand what dementia is. Pupils will be exploring common misconceptions connected to the disease.

- **Dementia in the Community**

Pupils will be exploring the types of difficulties people with dementia may experience. Pupils will also be investigating ways in which communities can support people living with dementia

- **Blended Families.**

Pupils will be investigating the variations in different types of family. Pupils will also be identifying the potential conflict that can occur in step families. Pupils will evaluate on how to learn how to deal with this conflict.

- **Parenting**


Pupils will be assessing some of the consequences of being a parent -reviewing social, financial, physical, educational and emotional problems and evaluating how this can be combat. Pupils will also evaluate the qualities required to be a good parent-exploring the difficulties that can come with this.

- **Assessment – Reviewing and consolidating learning through an end of term assessment.**

PEER MENTORING TRAINING

Last week a group of pupils completed their training to become peer mentors. Mrs Lynch was in charge of the training which took two days which went smoothly. The pupils were put into different scenarios which will help them when meeting with their mentees. They all did brilliantly and I'm sure that they will all do an excellent job.



Extended Project Qualification

This term, 25 Year 13 pupils have completed their EPQ projects and presented their work to panels of teachers and guests.

An EPQ (Extended Project Qualification) is a qualification that sits alongside A-Levels and involves an independent research project on a topic of the pupil's choice. It culminates in a major essay or creative artefact, plus a presentation. Universities value the EPQ for the crucial skills it develops—such as research, time management, and critical thinking—and it often earns UCAS points equivalent to half an A-Level.

We were delighted to welcome past pupil Sam Casey, who joined several of the panels.



Pupils completed a wide variety of projects covering an impressive range of topics, including:

- An analysis of *Jackbox Games*
- Should the UFC change practices around cutting weight to improve safety and reduce long-term health risks for athletes?
- *Justice or Just Pressure?* The Ethics of Interrogation Tactics
- Stats in Football: Progressing or ruining the sport?
- What are the psychological effects of video games on young people?

We would like to thank all the staff who supported our pupils with their projects.

We look forward to relaunching the EPQ programme next term with Year 12.

I **managed my time effectively** and kept my work organised.


Improvable points:

My questionnaire **relied on self-report**, which can be subjective or biased.



HGS and the District Youth Forum

On **Tuesday 2nd December** Year 10 pupils: Kobi J, Joseph A, Shivn T, Stanley S, Ollie R, Fin H and Alexander I-R all represented The Harvey at the Folkestone and Hythe District Council Youth Forum. The forum itself is part of the district's new initiative to involve younger people in local issues that affect them, and understand more about the district's electoral and administrative processes. Below is a report of the visit made by Shivn.




We went to the Folkestone and Hythe district council to join the local youth forum with students from The Beacon, Brockhill Park, EKC Folkestone Junior College, Folkestone School for Girls, and The Marsh Academy. We discussed many topics (such as solar farms, social media, and a refurbishment project for the Lower Leas Costal Park play area) with the council chair, Anita Jones, and many others.

We discussed our views on how the UK should generate its energy, focusing particularly on the role of solar power. Our conversation explored the potential benefits of expanding solar panel use in the UK, including their ability to provide clean, renewable energy and reduce reliance on fossil fuels. We also considered how solar technology could fit into the UK's broader energy strategy, weighing its advantages against practical challenges such as weather variability and installation costs.


We discussed how effective advertisements are on younger people and reflected on whether they personally appeal to us. Our conversation explored the ways marketing strategies are designed to capture the attention of younger audiences, as well as how these tactics influence our own reactions. We also considered which types of adverts are most engaging and whether they genuinely persuade us or simply blend into the background.

We also took part in a vote on the plans for refurbishing the play area at our local Lower Leas Coastal Park (last refurbished 25 years ago). During this discussion, we considered different ideas for improving the space and talked about how the changes could benefit the community. The voting process helped us share our preferences and contribute to shaping the future of a place many of us use and enjoy.

It was a very fun and completely new experience for most of us, something that pushed us out of our usual routines and allowed us to try something different together. It also allowed us to communicate our ideas to a wide range of youth from all around our area and we are very proud and excited to represent our school again in March.



ENGLISH DEPARTMENT



In Terms 1 and 2, the new Year 7s explore Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, by J.K Rowling as part of their Transition into the study of English at The Harvey. They begin to study the writer's craft - exploring themes, plot and characterisation as well as core elements of Fantasy fiction.

The reason we chose this novel (which may well already have read or be familiar with) is for exactly that reason – we want the boys to feel comfortable and confident in discussing the text - beginning to build their skills for the future. It must be noted, that Harry is 11 years old when he goes to Hogwarts, so our Year 7 boys are experiencing many of the things that Harry goes through in the book: going to a new school, making new friends, navigating new subjects and essentially beginning the next phase of their lives.

Harry Potter & The Philosopher's Stone

Book Review by Teddy B – 7M

Harry Potter is a boy wizard, The Philosophers Stone is not just a classic, but also the first of Harry's misadventures.

On June 26th, 1997, Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone was published, taking over the literary world with its 'spellbinding, enchanting, bewitching stuff' and proclaimed as 'one of the greatest literary adventures of modern times'. Now, here I am, 28 years later, reviewing this book of wizardry and witchcraft to see why it is as popular as it is, and does it deserve to be?

Harry Potter is a son of a witch and a wizard, now 'parted' from them and forced to live with a neglecting and miserable 'muggle' family, the Dursleys. During his time with them many odd happenings occur, like the beautifully described disappearance of the boa constrictor's glass. After letters from 'Hogwarts' a kind-hearted half-giant named Rubeus Hagrid tells Harry that he's a wizard!

He's registered into Hogwarts (which is a magical school) meets Hermione and Ron, a witch and a wizard, and becomes rather suspicious of a teacher called Snape...

The rest is up for you to read, to find secrets and read the bamboozingly brilliant humour and writing of J.K. Rowling, the creator.

Look out for his trip through Diagon Alley, but if squeamish, maybe avoid the troll...

I recommend reading this book in a dark but well-lit room to give the book a magical feeling.

All-in-all, this book is truly deserving of its praise and led the way for modern day fantastical creatures and fantasy, possibly inspiring the likes of Artemis Fowl and many more not so fairytale-like magical stories. J.K. Rowling gave a sense of fantasy not seen since the days of The Hobbit and Lord of The Rings, rejuvenating the fantasy world, just in a way that no-one had done before, with sharp, clever and witty humour and brilliant storytelling. As a result, this novel is worthy of an elusive perfect score, 5 out of 5, a full house, but whatever you call it, all summarise the true deserved rating, for The Boy Who Lived...

Year 7 French pupils have just sent cards to their new penfriends at Collège Haffreingue in Boulogne-sur-mer. We look forward to receiving their replies next term.


All of Year 9 were involved in the GCHQ National Languages Competition in November which was a huge success!

GCHQ National Language Competition 2025

As part of our MFL enrichment programme, our Year 9 pupils were invited to take part in the GCHQ National Language Challenge which took place in November.



The aim of the event is to promote language learning, along with developing code breaking and puzzle solving skills.

Pupils are grouped in teams of four, working together to solve virtual challenges in various languages.

The competition is hosted on a platform called 'Arena' and pupils were allocated teams/usernames.

For each task, pupils had to use their linguistic knowledge, along with code breaking and puzzle solving skills to identify a pattern or a solution.

The results this year were fantastic – our best ever!

One of our teams, Adventurous Tortoise (Danesh, Henry, Jacob & Albie) were placed 32 nationally & 8th in the South East of England.

A third year win for Mrs Wyllie's team!!!

The GCHQ Language Competition was a competition conducted by the British Government. It was a series of questions created to test the way you think about different language puzzles. It was only for pupils in year 9. The puzzles ranged from easy all the way to extreme and these were very challenging! Some puzzles involved you to finish sentences in uncommon languages and some even involved lip-reading!

The team "Adventurous Tortoise" came 1st in the Harvey, 8th in Kent and 32nd in the UK. The GCHQ competition helped us to think differently about difficult language questions and helped to develop teamwork skills.

Overall, it was a fun and exciting learning experience!

The GCHQ National language Competition is an annual competition between year 9 students across the country, split into nearly 3,000 groups of four. Keep up the good work Year 7's and we look forward to your next homework project, which will be focused on what you have learned so far in Chemistry!




